# **2019 Improvements**

 In 2018 the school did not meet its commitment to support the kindergarten to deliver 20 minutes a day of literacy from the start of the year. This is a critical part of the program, and because it was not done, another year of students will not be as ready to start school as they should be.

 This is a big problem, and the school and kindergarten need to commit to doing it next year. This will ensure students progress through primary school and are ready for high school.

 The school and kindergarten leadership need to do more next year to ensure they deliver this.

Other areas for improvement include:

- introduce numeracy classes
- expand the arts program to deliver on music and drama as per the 2018 commitment by both kindergartens
- introduce wellbeing classes to support child development, resilience and confidence.

what parents can 8 Enrol your child in Pre-Prep at least two weeks before it starts. Get medical issues sorted out so there are no interruptions to your child starting Pre-Prep. • Organise with your child's teacher to sit in class for the first few weeks to help your child settle in. Make sure your child has a birth certificate ready for enrolment.

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#### **Highlights**

- Coen Pre-Preps started going to weekly assemblies and participated in Family Education Days, Dads for Kids Day and Book Week.
- Hope Vale Pre-Preps began visiting the school and Prep room, meeting teachers and getting familiar with school routine. They also took part in Family Education Days, Book Week and National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children's Day.
- Hope Vale collected hearing data to understand the needs of next year's Prep students.

- Coen and Hope Vale continue to show steady improvement in NAPLAN and we are closing the gap on the national average.
- In Coen, 10 students in Year 6 and three students in Year 5 completed the Direct Instruction Reading Mastery Program and worked on the Academic Scholars Program, which included grade level Australian Curriculum content.
- In Hope Vale, four students in Year 6 completed the Direct Instruction Reading Mastery Program and worked on the Academic Scholars Program, which included grade level Australian Curriculum content.
- AFL star Anthony 'Walla' McDonald-Tipungwuti visited Coen and Hope Vale schools for a week each in October. He has been trained in how to support students doing Direct Instruction literacy and numeracy. He is passionate about the importance of education for Indigenous children in remote communities. 'I told the kids here, I wish I had that kind of support when I was growing up,' he said.



Spelling Mastery




NAPLAN is a test for Year 3 and Year 5 students. It tests skills that are essential for every child to progress through school. The exams are every year in May, and every student in these years in Australia sits the same test so they can be compared and ensure all are getting taught properly for their needs.





### **2019 Improvements**

- Intervention teachers will be introduced to the school to focus on accelerating students who fall behind in mastering their literacy and numeracy skills.
- Teachers will receive training on how to review student progress so they can provide targeted intervention and acceleration throughout the term.
- The school leadership will work with teachers to formally review all students' progress each term to ensure they are tracking to where they need to be, and create action plans with parents to accelerate students who are falling behind.
















Club

Ensures students develop their own unique talents and passions in music, art and sport through learning and performance, which they can continue to develop in high school.

#### **Highlights**

- CYAAA held its four-day music camp at Lake Tinnaroo in August. 23 students from Coen and Hope Vale schools joined the final performance at Trinity Bay High School in Cairns, where they performed in front of a large audience. The school choir also sang Bama Muganh-muganh in Guugu Yimidhirr.
- Hope Vale's school band performed at the Big Talk One Fire Indigenous Cultural Festival in Cairns in June. They did a traditional dance, sang the school song in Guugu Yimidhirr and played Billy Jean by Michael Jackson. The Band Camp was featured in an ABC News video and in the Cairns Post. The ABC video has almost 7000 views on Facebook.
- Hope Vale held a swimming carnival in November with the Swimming Queensland swimming program, and three school staff got their Learn to Swim qualification so they can teach swimming classes.





#### **Highlights**

- Coen students went to Culture Camp at Station Creek on Ayapathu homelands in September. Hosted by Ayapathu elders, the students learned traditional dances, trapping, spear-making and family connections to the lands of Coen. They also bushwalked with local rangers to learn about traditional and modern environmental management.
- Hope Vale students went to Culture Camp at Durrigin Bigu (Indian Head) in September. They learned traditional dances, spear-making and traditional fishing practices, and made local crafts with beach materials. They learned about family connections to the land, and heard traditional stories of the land they were camping on. They also bushwalked with local rangers to learn about traditional and modern environmental management.
- Hope Vale Cultural Language students went on an excursion to Maarramaga in February to explore native plants and animals.



- Get ongoing health issues checked out.









Term 1 top 10 attending schools in QLD Indigenous communities
